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On the latest episode of *Indiecast*, Ian and I inducted four more albums into the *Indiecast* Hall Of Fame. Among them is Jane's Addiction's 1990 masterwork, *Ritual De Lo Habitual*. At first we wondered: Is this album too famous for inclusion? Then again, we don't often hear it discussed with the great albums of this era. Jane's broke up in 1991, right as alt-rock was really blowing up. And in a way they really helped to set the table for that explosion. Now they're remembered for maybe having the most squandered talent in rock history. Dave Navarro especially, but also Perry Farrell. For two or three years they were the new Robert Plant and Jimmy Page! And now it feels embarrassing to suggest that! But just put on "Three Days" — it is one of the most amazing songs of this period, a pile up of guitar solos where Dave Navarro overplays his ass off. Check out the podcast here.

Comprised of 3 CDs and 1 LP, the set includes the original album newly remastered by The Doors' longtime engineer and mixer Bruce Botnick, two bonus discs of unreleased studio outtakes, and the stereo mix of the original album on 180-gram virgin vinyl. The music will also be available from digital and streaming services the same day, as will a new Dolby Atmos mix of the original album by Botnick.
